

# Reporting Concerns About Child, Young Person Policy



"I trust them to act in my best interests and listen to me."

# Intent

We are proactive and intervene early when we are concerned about the wellbeing or behaviours of a child or young person. We understand and implement our obligations to report abuse and harm.

We do not act alone, and we discuss concerns with our colleagues.

# Requirements

### Raise and discuss concerns

Kaimahi must raise child abuse concerns with management/their delegate as soon as possible.

The concerns and reporting them to Oranga Tamariki will be discussed with the young person and their parents/guardians unless there are safety issues or it's not reasonably practicable.

(Note: Notifications can be made on a confidential basis).



### What should be reported

The following forms of abuse, indicated through assessment or a young person's disclosure or behaviour will usually be reported to New Zealand Police and/or Oranga Tamariki:

- sexual offences
- physical assault
- neglect (e.g depriving a child of basic necessities like kai, shelter, supervision or medical care)
- theft of money or other possessions from a child or young person by a caregiver
- providing illegal drugs to a child or medications that are not prescribed for them.

## Reporting

Criminal activity should be reported to New Zealand Police (including threats of assault and fraud as financial abuse)

Concerns about serious harm to a child/ young person will be reported to:

- Phone emergency services on 111

#### Exceptions

Sometimes, abuse will not be reported if the child/young person is safe from abuse and no longer at risk having regard to:

- the child's/young person's views about reporting
- $_{\circ}$  the recency and impacts of the abuse
- protective factors in the current living situation (eg access to support, the involvement of other agencies)

#### o other signs of safety.

If a rangatahi was abused in the past, a report may not be needed. However, a report to Police or Oranga Tamariki will be made in these circumstances if it would be in the <u>best</u> <u>interests</u> of <u>other</u> rangatahi/tamariki.

#### **Record** notification

Notifications to Oranga Tamariki must be recorded in rangatahi files along with that agency's response. They will also be recorded and tracked in our central register (ie <u>abuse notification register.</u>)

Notifications in the register that are not responded to in a timely way will be followed up for a response with Oranga Tamariki.
